Biographical Information

Saco Rienk DeBoer was born in the village of Ureterp in the Netherlands in 1883. Suffering from tuberculosis, DeBoer moved to America in 1908 in search of dryer conditions to ease his condition. After a brief stay in Maxwell City, New Mexico, DeBoer moved to Denver. He found work at the old city nursery and as a teamster for the Denver City Parks Department. After converting a dump on Cherry Creek into Sunken Gardens Park, DeBoer caught the eye of Mayor Speer. After the death in 1910 of Reinhart Schuetze, the city's first landscape architect, Mayor Speer named De Boer as his successor.
